

SPRING NEWSLETTER Bright Changes Ahead

I accepted the position of CEO for CommUnity Crisis Services and Food Bank almost one year ago. In that year, much has changed. We committed to keeping the food bank at Pepperwood Plaza to provide a better shopping experience for clients, and space to meet increased community needs. We hired our first mental health liaison in partnership with the Iowa City Police Department to divert those in crisis from hospitalization and jail. We secured a national contract to provide chat and text crisis support through the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. Our Crisis Triage Counselors began serving as the main access point for the GuideLink Center, open 24/7 to serve those experiencing mental health or substance use crises.

We have another year of dramatic and positive change ahead of us. The implementation of 988 in July is going to provide individuals in crisis unprecedented access to mental health support locally and throughout our country. Our location at 1121 S. Gilbert Court is undergoing a remodel to accommodate our expanding Mobile Crisis Outreach program, crisis helpline services, and to create a family-friendly waiting area for our clients. We have a newly hired Director that will focus on ensuring client-centered programming throughout our Food

Bank and Basic Needs programs to address food insecurity and economic crisis.

Through over 50 years of service to our community, we recognize that change is the only constant. Nonetheless, change requires bravery from our staff, volunteers, donors, and community partners - the courage to let go of our comfort zone in exchange for the potential that lies ahead. Though our organization is ever-evolving, our roots will always be grounded in supporting our neighbors in crisis.

Without your generous support we would be unable to expand our services while holding fast to our values. All of us at CommUnity are excited for the year of change ahead, and we cannot wait to share our progress with you. We could not carry out the work of our mission without your steadfast support to make our community the best it can be.

Mental Health/Law Enforcement Liaison

Last summer, we welcomed Joachim "Joah" Seelos as the new Mental Health/Law Enforcement Ligison to work

with the Iowa City Police Department. Joah assists law enforcement officers on mental health calls and offers formal and informal cross-training between law enforcement and behavioral health disciplines, alternative response and intervention for those experiencing a mental health crisis, and an increase in follow up and resource connection for individuals and families.

Youth Mobile Crisis Counselor After working with CommUnity for the past four years, Parth Patel has been promoted to a new Mobile Crisis position which works directly with

youth in Johnson and Iowa Counties. Patel has extensive training in youth crisis deescalation, ACES Training, ASIST, CIT and Trauma Informed Yoga.

"Crisis work is meaningful for me because it allows me to sit with an individual experiencing intense emotions, allow them to openly express these painful feelings, and then collaborate to identify alternative coping strategies and resources that can promote safety and improved functioning," said Parth. "No one should have to go through a challenging time on their own, and I'm grateful to be in a role that allows me to provide culturally competent crisis support to any youth in lowa City regardless of socioeconomic status."



Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Outreach Specialist

We recently welcomed Amel Ali to the newly created position of Diversity, Equity

and Inclusion (DEI) Outreach Specialist. Amel will champion the importance and value of a diverse and inclusive Mobile Crisis Outreach program, one that is aware of the specific needs of all members within our community. She will lead grassroots outreach efforts that build relationships and create personal connections with the goals of reducing stigma and increasing access to crisis services for all.
